# **Chair's Report**

I would like to open my report for 2024 by thanking all of my fellow Board members for their commitment and contribution to my first year as Chairperson. Without their continued support it would have been a very different year! In tandem with tireless effort from the regional staff we have remained focused on supporting athletes, teachers, coaches and volunteers, to the best of our ability in the midst of significant changes within our National Governing Body, Swim England, and the associated impact for us.

I think we will look back on 2024 as a watershed year. The results of the Listening Report made difficult reading, but the approach of the new CEO, Andy Salmon, and the spirit of consultation and collaboration he demonstrated in the summer Roadshows, marks the beginning of a new chapter in the history of Swim England.

Knowing that a new strategy was being developed, and being reassured that as a Region we would be able to contribute to its content, we held our own strategy workshop in June. A focused group representing all areas of the region, including disciplines, officials, coaches, volunteers and staff met to share ideas about how to create the best environment possible for athletes of all ages and abilities to flourish. It was an enlightening day and I am grateful for all of those who readily and optimistically contributed. While we have attempted to incorporate key learnings into our immediate focus, specifically on Safeguarding & Welfare, we have refrained from launching a completely new strategy document as we are keen to ensure it is aligned with that of our NGB who launched their strategy towards the end of 2024. Work will continue on this in 2025 and I am confident we will have something to share by the middle of the year.

"Why does this matter to us"? I hear some of you say. Having a well thought through and easily

understood vision and strategy demonstrates a sense of direction to our membership, promotes a positive culture and supports the appropriate prioritisation and allocation of resources to develop Aquatics in the South East. Put simply, it should guide everything we do, how we do it and provide a framework with which to hold ourselves accountable.

The Regional Management Board has continued to operate as in previous years with monthly meetings primarily online, augmented with a full day face to face meeting in November. There has been no major change to our membership, although there have been some minor changes as a result of the Governance review completed in 2023. Roger Prior remains as the Board Member responsible for Finance and Brian Deval continues to lead on Communications. Roger Penfold is the Board member responsible for Welfare, supported by the regional welfare officer Andy Giess. The staffing group has been replaced by the Nominations Committee chaired by Carys Jones and there is a new Audit Committee chaired by Chris Lee. The Governance Committee continues, chaired by me. The Strategy and Development groups have been combined into a single committee chaired by Jenny Gray. The disciplines continue to operate their individual management structures with input into the Strategy and Development committee as required. Each discipline continues to have a Board liaison member. Currently there are eight regions in Swim England and the South East continues to be the largest with 34,175 individual members representing almost 22% of the total membership. We are also the most complex region with 6 counties and 169 Clubs. This continues to test us all! The lack of "competition ready" facilities persists, the cost of hiring those available continues to rise, and yet again in 2024, Mike Lambert and the Swimming Committee worked miracles to accommodate all those athletes who qualified for the Regional Swimming Championships. As many of you will remember, the difficulty of this feat was exacerbated with the breakdown of the boom at one of the pools. We are indebted to the team who navigated through this exceptionally stressful time, ensuring athletes could appropriately qualify for the National Championships.

We are equally indebted to the regional staff who contribute daily to the success of our region. Led by Kristie Jarrett, the interim regional manager,

and supported by Kate Hutchinson, a range of 35 volunteer training programmes were delivered in the Region; these are shown in more detail on page 17.

I would also like to acknowledge the contribution of Caroline Burke who, in the absence of Bryony Gibbs, stepped in to support the Board's administration and management of the regions finances. We are excited about the return of Bryony Gibbs following her parental leave and congratulate her and Lee on the arrival of their daughter Olive.

As in previous years the team work far more hours than they are contracted to provide and, as the smallest regional team supporting the largest, most complex region, it is only appropriate that we review the current structure in line with the aims and ambitions of the overall Swim England Strategy and requests for support from the various disciplines and the specific regional programmes. This commenced at the end of 2024 and we aim to complete mid 2025. I am delighted to confirm that Caroline has agreed to extend her support until then.

It was a pleasure to attend the National Swimming Awards ceremony in Birmingham in November. As a Region we had reinstated a physical awards ceremony and it was extremely pleasing to note those who were invited to attend the national ceremony as potential award recipients.

Congratulations to Albatross Diving for being voted the Swim England Diving Club of the Year. As usual, there follows detailed reports from each discipline and I would like to thank all of the volunteers across the South East who provide so much support to enable aquatics to thrive. Of course, we always need more. As my predecessor commented in last year's report "many hands make light work" so please support your clubs, counties and region to maintain the pool of talent required to deliver a safe and enjoyable aquatic experience!

# **Finance**

The accounts submitted show the comparisons with the previous year, which was the second year after the COVID crisis. It can be seen that total income is much the same, whilst total expenditure shows a modest decrease.

It is again disappointing that a budget of substantial excess of expenditure over income has turned into a surplus of income over expenditure. The disciplines that are most resource hungry are still finding it very difficult to find volunteers to run their activities and many of those planned have not taken place. As I said last year, the Regional Staff support the disciplines as much as possible, but volunteers are needed if a full programme of events is to be achieved.

#### **Income**

The total income is very similar to last year. Our membership income has held up, showing that we are not losing members. Once again the Board has decided that there is no need to increase our low fees. A new sponsor has come on board to run swim shops at our events and income from that has gone up.

#### **Expenditure**

Overall expenditure is slightly down on last year. The Regional Management Board expenditure increased, but that was a result of having an awards ceremony at our November meeting. Expenditure by the disciplines was down substantially. By and large this was caused by a dramatic improvement in the cost of Speed Swimming.

A substantial reason for that was a change in policy as to how we account for the overseas camp. The camp takes place in January, so most of the expenditure pre-payments (Hotels, flights entry fees) take place in the latter part of the previous year. That expenditure for the 2024 camp appeared in the 2023 accounts. The payments for the 2025 camp have been accrued to appear in the accounts for the year in which the camp takes place.

The Swimming Championship entry fees were increased in the latter part of 2023, but that effect has only shown up fully in the 2024 figures, as the majority of the income occurs in the middle of the year.

Artistic Swimming costs rose because of the change in regulations by World Aquatics, which also meant that the full range of competitions could not take place.

There was a significant decrease in demand for Coaching Bursaries this year, which we think was due to the fact that the backlog caused by COVID has settled down (these are reported on page 17 of this report).

#### **Thanks**

My thanks are due, yet again, to our Regional staff, Bryony Gibbs, Kristie Jarrett and Kate Hutchison for their support and to Caroline Burke, who joined us to cover Bryony's maternity leave, and who got herself up to speed on the Sage accounting system remarkably swiftly and has done a great job with our finances and servicing the Finance Group, as well as other administrative tasks. I must also thank the Finance Group for their support and advice. Finally, the Discipline Managers have done a good job managing their budgets and I thank them for that.

#### **The Future**

The fall in interest rates I predicted last year has not been as steep as expected, so our bank interest income has remained substantial, but who knows whether that will last. The transfer to the new Limited Company continues to be slow. We have been taking much advice from our accountants and the other Regions to ensure that our transfer does not incur tax liabilities, but we hope to have that taking place in the next few months. As the company has again been dormant throughout 2024, there are no accounts to present to the AGM.

# **Discipline Reports**

# **Artistic Swimming**

Although the leadership group continue to meet virtually for our group meetings we are a small community so we often attend the same Regional & National events (grade assessment days and competitions) and discuss matters arising. It means that meetings do not have to be long or so often and people can focus on their own area without have to listen to the operational matters of others.

- **Di Hughes** leads on bookings venues, events & competitions.
- Steve Fuller leads on grade assessments.
- Helen Barrand leads on volunteer training and development.
- Kate Coupar leads the regional development squad.
- Louise Ross leads on teacher & coach education, she also leads on masters and is our link to the National Leadership Team.
- Erica Moo is a GB Judge and leads on the technical updates/training for our existing Judges.
- Kate Hutchinson is our rock and is often our facilitator with Swim England at Loughborough.

#### **Talent development**

Right at the end of 2023 31 swimmers aged 11yrs – 15yrs attended the Regional Development Squad Trials with 18 athletes being selected for the 2024 squad. The objective of the squad was to enter Regional events in May 2024 and to be the pathway into the future National Squads (GB Senior, Junior & England Youth). This gives GB staff an opportunity to see the talent coming through the system.

In competition our squad finished 2nd overall sharing joint 1st on points.

The South East Regional Development Squad had 9 training days in 2024. The squad were supported by five staff as well as an external specialist working with the swimmers on the core strength with regular Pilates and land- based exercises.

#### **Sport development**

We ran three regional events during the year:

**February**: Regional Age Group Competition @ K2 **June**: Regional Routine Competition @ K2 **November**: Regional Figure Competition @ K2

For some clubs, these events serve as a warm up event for National competitions but this is also a competitive opportunity for the clubs who did not qualify for Nationals.

The Region also hosted seven Grade Assessments opportunities. Each assessment centre gave the opportunity to enter both figure and routine grades.

#### **Club development**

The legacy of the Duet silver medal at the Olympics has given a real boost to the sport with an increased demand from younger swimmers to join clubs.

However, clubs in the South East continue to struggle with access to deep water (deeper than 2m). Oxford & Witney lost one of their main pools in the summer and have not been able to find a replacement. Private schools are being used by more South East Clubs, but these are often not suitable venues for large Club sessions, competitions and fundraising events/shows.

The Electric Eels Downs Syndrome Synchronised Swimming Club (Windsor) travelled to Ireland in April and met the newly formed and first Irish Downs Syndrome Synchronised Swimming Club. The swimmers participated in a training camp at Clongowes Wood College in County Kildare which included four male swimmers. Both clubs agreed that the camp was a success and plan for it to become a regular fixture in their calendar.

#### **Workforce development**

The National Leadership Team are leading many aspects of Artistic Swimming training. Some courses were face to face but many course offered are via zoom.

The National Leadership Team ran Technical Officer Training, Level 2 Judge and National Referee courses during the year.

Clubs have embraced regional courses that have included Team Manager, Welfare Officer & Safeguarding training. We have also hosted Level 1 Judge courses and Level 1 & 2 coaching courses.

# **Diving**

We are pleased to report that the number of divers enjoying the sport are back to pre-pandemic levels. This is despite organisational changes at Southampton Diving Academy following the departure of one of their lead coaches.

The Paris Olympics led to a surge in the numbers applying for diving lessons with most clubs now having significant waiting lists.

We hosted two successful national qualifying events during the year that enabled 27 Age Group and 38 Skills divers to reach the National Qualification Score.

In addition to diver participation at Swim England and Aquatic GB National Diving Events the region supported the events with Judges and Recorders joining the volunteer workforce for the events as well as providing Live Streaming expertise.



#### **Talent development**

Our regional development programmes are ongoing and successful. This is a proven programme that is again showing results at National level. With the retirement of Lindsey Fraser we will need to look again at how this programme is delivered but, given its success over many years, our aim is for it to continue albeit in a modified form.

#### **Sport development**

Southampton Diving Academy has been identified as one of three National Talent Development Centres. The ambition is that these centres will deliver programmes and content for both athletes and parents.

The successful SEEDS (South East England Diving Scheme) and ACE programs were temporarily halted to allow reorganisation following the opening of the new diving pool in Reading.

The opening of this pool provides excellent opportunities for many more divers in the region to train in new facilities and for coaches to embrace cross region coach development. Plans are also

being put in place for Pre-Skills divers to benefit from cross club coaching and competition. There will also be greater opportunities for diving lessons as well as some development competitions to support the start of young divers long term careers. Star Diving (Guildford) and Albatross Diving Club (Reading) are both running adult diving sessions that are proving very popular.

#### **Clubs & Membership Development**

There are six major diving centres in the region – Albatross Diving Club Reading, Amersham, Star Diving (Guildford), Maidstone Diving Cub, Southampton Diving Academy and Tunbridge Wells Diving Club. In addition there are diving clubs in Medway (Gillingham, Kent) and Worthing.

All these clubs would benefit from more coaching and support staff. The region has offered bursaries over the year which has made a difference but finding new people to take on the roles is still challenging.

It would be wonderful if all clubs were able to replicate the successful model used by Albatross Diving where all coaches and assistant coaches are drawn from divers, ex divers (some having returned after university) and family members of the club. But this unfortunately is not always possible.

#### **Workforce development**

Some clubs have reported a shortage of coaches however there has been a significant improvement in tutor availability which is starting to make a difference.

Most courses for officials are now nationally co-ordinated and the availability of appropriate material is also making a difference. We have also found that the on-line methodology works well with candidates busy schedules.

Albatross hosted a CPD in Rig Training with a similar course being run at Amersham in 2025.

#### **Masters**

Masters swimming in the region continues to provide our swimmers with the most robust competitive programme to our members, who responded with record number of Meet Best Performances as well as British, European, and World records being set by the region's athletes during the year.

Through the support of the Regional Board our competition development team have planned and delivered four championship events as well as a long-distance event that helps the region's swimmers gain national qualifying times. The region also contributed to the hosting of the regional round the National Inter County event at the LAC. We are very fortunate to have received the support of many of the region's officials, for which we are very grateful. Wherever possible these events were 'live streamed'.

# **Open Water**

We have seen a significant increase in the popularity of Open Water generally and this was reflected in the number of entries to the regional Championships. Although very positive we now have an urgent need to recruit more officials and Event Makers to help run the event.

Our biggest problem in 2024 was technical issues caused by the remoteness of that venue which compromised our connectivity and consequently the efficient running of the event, particularly the results service. Investment by the region for 2025 will make a significant difference.

Having an established venue at Mercers Country Park, we were able to confirm dates in 2024 with the other regions and also ensure that our event was added Swim England Open Water Calendar as early as possible. We were also able to open the entry procedure much earlier giving our swimmers ample opportunity to enter and prepare.

Thanks to improved communications with clubs through all our channels, entries grew from 152 in 2023 to 345 in 2024. Entry numbers to our Championships were also boosted by the decision from Swim England to allow South East Region to enter seven swimmers in each Age Group instead of three as in previous

years. The earlier date also helped coaches prepare their swimmers without impacting on preparation for the Nationals. After discussions with the Masters group, we were able to include separate events for Masters, which proved very popular and helped push entries from 14 in 2023 to 84 in 2024.

#### **Talent development**

As discussed in the Swimming report, athletes between 12-14 were invited to participate in an open water experience as part of a distance development programme. The majority of the athletes who attended the camp also competed in either our regional competition or national open water event.

South East athletes were hugely successful at the national open water event with Portsmouth Northsea SC coming away as top club.

#### **Workforce Development**

We are still trying to encourage more people to take the 3hour online course. This has been partially successful with a few more officials joining the team over the past couple of years. But we still need more to join the team to ensure the continued success of Open Water Swimming.

Although experience is helpful, it is not a prerequisite that candidates need to be a qualified swimming official to complete this Open Water Official course.

# **Para Swimming**

During the year the region organised three para development days.

The first camp was in January with 14 athletes attending, followed by another in June with 13 athletes in attendance, and the final one of 2024 being held in December with 10 athletes. The camps have been hosted at two venues this year, ACS International school in Cobham and Eastwood Leisure Centre in Woking.

Our experienced regional coaching team continue to deliver a day that includes education for the athletes around both their dry and pool based training, including challenging pool based work, as well as an opportunity for those athletes starting their classification journey to be observed in the water to enable them to be added to the classification waiting list.



The region has continued to welcome qualified coaches and teachers to attend the para development days for their continued professional development, as this is an ideal environment for them to observe adapted training drills around individual athletes needs.

The expectation in 2025 is to build on the work that has already taken place and to give both classified and non-classified swimmers the best possible opportunities for development so that they can go on to reach their personal goals.

#### **Development Meet - September 2024**

We once again joined with the South West region to host a focused development meet, this time in Bristol.

Eleven athletes from the South East entered the event, with some great PBs achieved so early in the season. The atmosphere was great with the athletes supporting each other and showing the true spirit of sportsmanship throughout.

In 2025 it will be the South East's turn to host this event – at the Rivermead Leisure Centre in

Reading on 13th September. With support from the National team, we are hoping to engage two classification teams with the aim of supporting a larger number of swimmers through classification by the end of 2025. Entries will be accepted from all regions, and classification slots will be determined by the National team.

#### **Workforce Development**

#### **Coach development**

The main development opportunities in 2024 have been the CPD offer that we have provided at our development days, with 8 coaches having attended in this capacity. We will continue to offer this to clubs in 2025.

During the year Sue Barker, who had been our Para Swimming Manager for many years, retried from that role. We would like to thank her for many years of service to the region.



# **Swimming**

In 2024, we again delivered a full programme of swimming activities. These included two major Swimming Championships:

- Long Course (Spring) in April / May.
- Short Course (Winter) in November.

These were both delivered within guidelines set by the Swim England Swimming Discipline Group and guidelines published by the Swim England National Licensing Committee.

We did experience a significant issue at the Age Group Championships in Crawley when the boom failed to drop. This meant that the weekend competition had to be run short course.

With significant co-operation from coaches, Swim England, Everyone Active and Crawley Borough Council we were able to accommodate everyone who wanted to get a long course time with an opportunity to swim again.

#### **Facilities**

Although we have six 50m pools in the region, we are having difficulty finding suitable pools to hold our championships. The availability of full weekends is very restricted, because pool operators place restrictions on the number of weekends that pools can be closed to the public and they want to provide continuity to weekend swimming lessons. In addition, several pools are not being properly maintained.

There is also the challenge of accommodating the number of spectators that want to watch their children swim. The newest facility (Winchester Sports and Leisure Park) is only able to hold 240 spectators. Wycombe Leisure Centre provide excellent water and dry land facilities but can only accommodate 270 spectators, whilst K2 at Crawley has capacity of 390 spectator but does have limitations for swimmers; we built additional accommodation in the car park for our Age Group Championship in 2024.

#### Live stream

One of the drivers for investing in live stream for all our competitions is to provide an opportunity for anyone who cannot travel to events or access spectator tickets to watch all the action. We have also noticed that viewing numbers grow after each event and have anecdotal reports that this is because coaches are able to use the videos to provide coaching tips.

#### **Succession Planning**

I had planned to step down from the role of Swimming Manager at the end the July 2024. That did not happen, because there were no expressions of interest.

The role of Swimming Manager is to manage swimming activities, not necessarily to deliver those activities. I have been concentrating on building teams to take on delivery activities and this has been partially successful. All of the roles associated with the delivery of the 2024 short course championships were covered and, although I attended the event, it would have run successfully without me.

We are also exploring opportunities for defined packages of work to be carried out by paid regional staff.

The big challenge is that the role of Swimming Manager is not one that can be restricted to specific periods around competitions, because things needing attention do not arrive at predictable times.

The role of Swimming Manager does need to be filled and we are continuing to encourage people to join the team.

#### **Regional Development Camps**

The region continues to deliver 3 annual camps for 13 year olds as part of the National Pathway Programme. Two of these are face to face and one is an online education afternoon. We invited 36 athletes to join the programme and, this the 2024/2025 season, they are representing 26 different clubs.

Matt Smart (Rushmoor) is the head coach.

#### **Regional Distance Programme**

Following a successful trial in 2023 we have expanded the open water development camp into a 2-day distance development programme. 36 athletes were selected based on their 800m and 1500m times from the 12 – 14 year-old age groups.

This is younger than in previous years to fit in with the national programmes and to give swimmers an earlier experience of open water. The first camp included a pool session, working on open water skills followed by a lake swim. We recruited a strong team of coaches, many with the open water coaching qualification.

Longside Lake in Egham, Surrey was again a very accommodating venue and worked well as a central location for the region. The camp was well supported by Carol and David Butler as Team Managers. The pool camp was run in September at ACS Cobham, unfortunately we experienced some athlete drop out due to the earlier than normal start to the competition season in some clubs which was disappointing and a consideration for next year.

#### **Off Shore Camp**

The regional Short Course Championships 2023 was again the selection event for the 2024 regional off shore camp.

A team of 24 swimmers were selected to travelled to Luxembourg to compete for the region in the Euro Meet in January. The team did themselves proud with many making A and B finals across the weekend. Most of the squad achieved best times while also gaining huge experience along the way.

Adam Naylor (RTW Monson) was nominated by the coaches' forum to attend as Head Coach. The other coaches were selected based on an application process. The applications were assessed against a person specification by England talent, the national coaching team, the head coach and the regional officer. Coaches included Stuart McCrea (Leatherhead) Jordan Honor (Thanet) and Tom Company from PNSC was our strength and conditioning lead. Team Managers were Lynne Harrison and Paul Baybutt.

#### **Coach development**

Swim England continue to lead on the informal coach development opportunities through the national team. The region continues to provide coach development through camp participation and in partnership through the inspire mentoring scheme.

We have 3 coach mentors working within swimming, Kevin Brookes (WDSC), David Vine (Reading SC) and Lee Spindlow (Guildford City). They are currently supporting 8 coaches from the South East. They hold quarterly review meetings with the mentors to discuss progress.

#### **Coaches Forum**

The forum continues to meet every two months online. The group met in person just before the start of the regional Youth competition in April with the purpose of reviewing the coaching part of the regional strategy and to looking at our priorities for the year ahead.

# **Water Polo**

Within the region, clubs have been working with our Club Links Team to deliver taster sessions and programmes to support Water Polo development – this programme encourages closer working relationships between clubs and learn to swim providers, by introducing people in the upper stages of learn to swim into local aquatic clubs, and provides funding to support this.

#### **Regional Development**

Alastair Roberts and Lauren Hand continue to lead the regional development programme for our junior players, with their hard work leading to the inter-regional championships that take place around the country.

The inter-regional championships have seen some great success for the South East, with special mention to the U16 girls who retained their title as regional champions; and the U18 girls who were undefeated in their matches in division 2.

Meetings have been taking place to recruit a group of individuals to support the development of Water Polo within the region, this has paid off and we have identified a small group who have offered their time. We are now at the stage of drawing up a viable remit for the group that does not place unrealistic demands on individual's time, yet enables a real contribution to the development of the sport.

#### **Workforce Development**

In April this year, we held a club and regional level referee course in Southampton with 14 candidates taking part. This course was delivered at no charge to Swim England club members.
